The goal of our training guidelines* is to provide a logical, structured approach where one skill builds on another for your training. We will follow these guidelines when planning club training sessions.

If you, as the handler, do your yard work on a regular basis both you and your dog will be more successful at club training sessions, when you train privately as a group, at tests and when hunting. Yard work skills are your responsibility.

At the end of the outline there is a Resources page where you will find links to publications, videos, websites and books. For those of you with young dogs we strongly suggest you enroll in a pet training class to begin your dog's career. You will learn HOW to teach your dog the basic obedience skills that are critical to moving forward.

Training can and should be fun!

Training Guidelines

Foundation Skills/Beginner

Yard Work (done at home)

- ▶ Simple obedience with treats
 - ▶ Coming when called
 - ▶ Sit
 - ▶ Walking on leash
- ▶ Casting Games with treats
- ▶ Platform work with treats
- ▶ Introduction to retrieving
- ▶ Introduction to water (if possible)
- ▶ Introduction to birds (if possible)
- ▶ Impulse control, add distractions as dog becomes successful

Training Session

- ▶ Introduction to gunner-thrown marks
- ▶ Introduction to gun fire (at a distance)
- ▶ Introduction to steady on leash
- ▶ Single retrieves (focus on returning to handler NOT necessarily on hold)
- ▶ Intro to decoys, duck calls, boats
- ▶ Impulse control (honor, steady)

Started / AKC Junior

Yard work (done at home)

- ▶ Formal obedience
 - ▶ Two sided heeling
 - ▶ Recall return to heel position
- ▶ Sit to whistle / Remote sit
- ▶ 3 handed casting
- ▶ Pile work
 - ▶ Single, double T
- ▶ Swim by
- ▶ E-collar conditioning (if applicable)
- ▶ Force fetch (if applicable)
- ▶ Platform

Training Session

- ▶ Singles off multiple guns
- ▶ Lead steady (taut lead with use of hand on release)
- ▶ Intro to simple or retired hidden guns
- ▶ Require delivery to hand
- ▶ Bird in mouth procedure with singles off multiple guns
- ▶ Teach land doubles
- ▶ Steady with limp lead or no lead
- ▶ Long non-cheating water marks
- ▶ Simple conventional de-cheating
- ▶ Simple water doubles
- ▶ Occasional e-collar use allowed for obedience going to/from line and steadiness

Transition (Blinds & Trail) Hunter/Intermediate/AKC Senior

Yard work (done at home)

- ▶ Blinds (land and water)
 - ▶ Walk out blinds
 - ▶ Sight blinds
 - ▶ Pattern blinds
 - ▶ Pattern blinds with diversions
 - ▶ Simple cold blinds
 - ▶ Lining drills
 - ▶ Channel blind
- ▶ Refer to Carol Cassity book
- ▶ Intro to trail

Training Session

- ▶ Blinds (land and water)
 - ▶ Sight blinds
 - ▶ Simple cold blinds
- ▶ Problem solve
- ▶ Trailing

Transition (Marks & Drills)

Yard Work (done at home)

- ▶ Change in cover marks (land)
- ▶ Cross wind marks (water)
- ▶ Wagon Wheel drill
- ▶ 8 handed casting
- ▶ No-No drills
- ▶ Obstacles
- ▶ Happy Marks
- ▶ Upland
- ▶ Honor

Training Session

- ▶ Marking progression
 - ▶ Simple cheating singles
 - ▶ Simple retired memory marks
 - ▶ Increase complexity of multiples
 - ▶ Build marking concepts
- ▶ Handling for marking errors such as switching, fading, going to area of old fall
- ▶ Happy Marks
- ▶ Upland
- ▶ Honor
- ▶ Handler with gun
- ▶ Walk-ups
- ▶ Send from bucket
- ▶ Remote send

What is a Happy Mark and why do it?

A happy mark is a short mark thrown either by you at the line or from the field that you know your dog will be successful at. Happy marks relieve the stress and pressure of drills and keep your dog's attitude positive. Happy marks are not a 'throw and let the dog go'. Your dog needs to sit until released and deliver to hand.

Yard work (done at home)

- ▶ Build on previously learned skills
- ▶ Review
- ▶ Teach

Training Session

- ▶ Build on marking and blind concepts
- ▶ Emphasis on steadiness and willingness to handle on marks
- ▶ Multiple blinds to factors such as dry shots, old falls and other diversions including poison birds
- ▶ Diversion marks, poison birds
- ▶ Long retired guns
- ▶ Secondary selection
- ▶ Obstacles
- ▶ Cross winds
- ▶ Technical water concepts
- ▶ Steady to shot and fall
- ▶ Honor
